CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chairman Dipola called the meeting to order at 2 p.m. and Joe Trottie led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENT

None.

► A. APPROVE THE JUNE 7, 2023 MEETING MINUTES

Vice Chairman Dipola asked for approval of the minutes of the June Citizens Advisory Committee meeting.

Charles Pappas moved to approve the June 7, 2023 minutes; Bernie O'Connor seconded; motion unanimously carried.

►B. FDOT REQUESTS AMENDING THE FY 2022/23 THROUGH FY 2026/27 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Victoria Kutney presented the following amendments to the Transportation Improvement Program for FY 2022/23 through FY 2026/27.

Ms. Kutney asked for questions.

- John Stack commented that A-1-A in Nassau County is being funded with SIS and non-SIS funds. Mr. Stack would like to know the distinction.
 - Ms. Kutney responded she will look into it and report back.
 - Mr. Chapman responded SR A-1-A is a SIS funded road from I-95 to the port and east of the port is non-SIS.
- Walter Kloss asked if these are new projects and/or new monies.
 - Ms. Kutney responded these are not new projects.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded we operate under a federal fiscal year. This will not affect the TIP we adopted in June. We are still operating under the old TIP for the next three months. This action will take these projects and move them back into the old TIP so they can continue to move forward.
- Walter Kloss commented fiscal year 2023 is over for FDOT.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded the federal fiscal year ends September 30 and applies to the projects with federal funds.
- Walter Kloss asked if the group could be provided with a definition of what fiscal year we are actually talking about.

- Mr. Sheffield responded that it doesn't change your decision. This is an administrative component and a procedural step that you are adopting.
- Vice Chairman Dipola stated any project we see here is just bringing it into the first quarter of FDOT's fiscal year.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded that is correct.
- Mario Dipola asked if this is the case with all the projects listed. If not, can you highlight the ones that are not already approved or are these all previously approved.
 - Ms. Kutney responded all the projects were previously approved and are in the June adopted TIP except for one of the 5310 projects that will need to be changed in October.
- Mario Dipola asked if the two removed projects were previously approved.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded they were removed from the letter not the TIP.
- Jim Hill asked what UZA stands for.
 - Ms. Brown responded UZA stands for urbanized area.
- Nichole Mobley asked what is the amount of additional funding being requested for project #445430-1.
 - Ms. Kutney responded this project was in the previous TIP and in the new TIP. Funding has been added to the different fund categories.
 - Mr. Sheffield said anything with an "AC" in front of it means advanced construction. This means money was taken from an outer year and brought into the current year to advance the project.
- Nichole Mobley asked what "DDR" means.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is district dedicated revenue, which is state funds.
- Nichole Mobile asked what "DS" means.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is district state funds.
- Nichole Mobley asked what "LF" means.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is local funds.
- Nichole Mobley asked what "SA" means.

Mr. Sheffield responded SU, XU all those mean the same thing. There are different iterations of bills and different codes for those sources.

Mr. Sheffield informed the group that if you look within the first five pages of the TIP it gives you all the acronyms and their meanings.

- Vice Chairman Dipola commented it would be helpful going forward if the changes were indicated within the amendment letter.
- Doug Conkey asked regarding the two Clay County projects if the resurfacing takes into account side projects within the area.

Mr. Sheffield responded resurfacing has been stripped back to resurfacing only. This reflects the continuing increased costs.

Doug Conkey asked if flood sensors are cameras or SNF technology.

Mr. Sheffield responded the flood sensors are technology that is being tested through SNF. An initial pilot was done in Neptune Beach with positive results. The TPO secured federal funds through FDOT to deploy this technology in each of the four counties on a small scale in some critical areas. This gives the counties the ability to see the results and decide if they want to procure these services and deploy them within their county. The TPO has no intent of regional funding to deploy across the region. Also, each of the four counties could possibly be testing different technologies.

 Doug Conkey asked who collects the data, is it county specific or a central clearinghouse, and does it go to the counties.

Mr. Sheffield responded each will be stand-alone and county specific. Dissemination of data is up to the county.

Bernie O'Connor moved to approve the FDOT's request to amend the FY 2022/23 through FY 2026/27 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); Scott Cowitt seconded; motion unanimously carried.

C. ANNUAL MOBILITY REPORT

Terry Shaw of Kimley-Horn gave a brief update on the Annual Mobility Report.

Mr. Shaw asked for questions.

Pat Keogh asked who collects the data.

Mr. Shaw responded Kimley-Horn was assigned that task by the TPO.

• Pat Keogh asked if this is the original information.

Mr. Shaw responded it is an extensive effort, and data is compiled from various sources.

Pat Keogh asked if this effort is done for each of the MPOs.

Mr. Sheffield responded not to this degree. We are required to do a congestion management process every five years as an update. We do this on an annual basis as a monitoring exercise.

Mr. Shaw commented that he likes to dig into why things are changing and that's why we included things like fuel prices and container costs.

Lisa McGlynn asked how the data collected will be used.

Mr. Sheffield responded it depends on which piece. For the TPO, it can affect project prioritization, where investments go and how funding is being expended. We can allow data to drive those decisions. Our priority list has added elements of resiliency, etc. This could have an impact on the LRTP process and how we set priorities in funding.

 Lisa McGLynn commented a lot of studies are being done that take the data and use it so it is beneficial.

Mr. Sheffield responded he agrees.

- Lisa McGlynn commented the data says we need to look at other transportation options besides car ownership.
- Vice Chairman Dipola asked about the slide that states a person is six times more likely to die if they are bike/ped and the slide that states 90% fatalities are related to drugs and alcohol. Mr. Dipola thinks they are only testing for drugs when there is a fatality.

Mr. Shaw responded this data is provided from the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles.

• Doug Conkey commented it is bike/ped and day vs. night. At night, our visual acuity is at best 2200 and day is 2020. Mass Transit density is a key factor in choosing where transit serves. Growth management rules have changed.

D. URBAN BOUNDARY UPDATE

Jeff Sheffield gave a brief update on the urban boundary update.

Mr. Sheffield asked for questions.

Mario Dipola commented Palatka is urban and not urbanized.

Mr. Sheffield responded we have extended an invitation to Palatka and they have chosen not to participate. Flagler County no longer participates as they have an MPO in their area. Baker County participates on a regular basis.

 Mario Dipola asked if the gap area in Marineland is covered by the River to Sea MPO.

Mr. Sheffield responded River to Sea has extended to the county line and now covers the gap area that includes Marineland.

Mario Dipola asked when the changes will be finalized.

Mr. Sheffield responded this will be finalized next year. There are certain deliverables in November that are related to our boundary and apportionment plan. The long-term steps include functional classifications of roadways changes and adjustments based on urbanized designations.

 Doug Conkey asked about the possibility of the Keystone Airport having a seat on the TPO Board.

Mr. Sheffield responded they are not a state defined transportation authority and are located within two counties.

We try to create some continuity on how the Board is structured. The first layer is apportionment by county that is based on population and must be an elected official holding the seat. The remainder are defined state transportation authorities.

E. SMART NORTH FLORIDA UPDATE

Clayton Levins gave the following update.

- St. Augustine has entered into a partnership with Modi. Modi is a web-based application that will create a digital twin of the city's parking assets and their availability. It will show real-time occupancy in the parking garage and the availability of on-street parking. They have also launched the Star Circulator that will serve the downtown area. Those bus stops are reflected on the application. In the coming months, geo tags will show you the bus location.
- Doug Conkey asked if Jacksonville will be a part of this program, specifically around the sports complex in downtown Jacksonville.

Mr. Levins responded hopefully this will allow communities around the region to see what is possible.

 Lisa McGlynn said this software will tell me the likelihood of a parking space being available. Ms. McGlynn would like to know what is the expected use of the application.

Mr. Levins responded the purpose is to identify a parking space within the community to plan your visit.

Mr. Sheffield responded the parking garage is real-time. Meters on the street have no sensors so the historical data gives you a likelihood scale and not an actual scale. The next level for them would be cameras or sensors.

• Charles Pappas commented it would be nice if they added parking with chargers.

Mr. Levins responded it is a phased approach and it has been a part of the conversation.

Patrick Keogh asked if SNF is using any artificial intelligence software.

Mr. Levins responded yes, but very cautiously.

 Patrick Keogh commented we have been using it to look at what other MPOs do with their decision modeling.

F. OLD BUSINESS

Doug Conkey asked if he could get a list of attendees at the TPO Board meeting.

Mr. Sheffield responded to look on the TPO website in the minutes from the Board meeting.

G. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

Joe Trottie asked if the City or JTA has approached the TPO about developing a
plan for the sports arena area. Mr. Trottie feels It will be necessary to plan for
routing, parking, etc. because a large number of people will frequent the stadium
area. The parking we accessed when I was at JTA is no longer available. It will
take all the players at the table to come together and devise a plan that is
feasible for the area.

Mr. Sheffield responded he has been in conversations with the Jaguars regarding this problem. The Jaguars have a strong interest in solving the parking challenges. Soon there will be apartments, a hotel, etc., and how do you manage a lot that is used by residents during the week and have it available for

game day parking on a Sunday. There are at least five different parking facilities within that area. There needs to be a sports district czar to begin these conversations, and it needs to be either the City or the Jaguars facilitating it.

• Joe Trottie commented JTA had buy-in from the Mayor's Office, JSO, Fire Department, etc.

Mr. Sheffield said one issue is how do you move towards a more automated environment where users can find out how much of the parking garage is being used when they attend an event. There are many elements to the equation.

- Scott Cowitt commented that with the ongoing construction not much can be done in that area for parking. Mr. Cowitt heard that the Jaguars were planning to work with JTA for more shuttle buses in more locations for game days.
- Vice Chairman Dipola commented Jacksonville Beach's Margaritaville has paid parking to accommodate their business. Many of their guests use the free parking resulting in no parking available for the public. He suggested a parking study for Jacksonville or Duval County as part of the UPWP.

Mr. Sheffield said the TPO recently did a parking study for Neptune Beach. This is within the framework of what we do. In December, we will ask for submissions for candidate studies.

H. CAC COMMENT

- Lisa McGlynn asked for clarification on the JTA rail project. Ms. McGlynn asked how what the TPO is doing and this project come together.
 - Mr. Sheffield said the commuter rail project is within the framework of requirements for our LRTP. JTA is beginning to refine the rail project so they can build out what a potential project would look like. This is just a step in the process. It will have to be adopted as a priority to be adopted into our TIP.
- Lisa McGlynn commented there has been a lot of focus on the area of SR 207 and the bypass. If this rail station goes in this proposed area, it will impact it significantly.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded we are in the middle of the LRTP update and are developing the socio-economic development data for the region. It is likely that a scenario would be to drop a station within this area and run the model to see the impacts. Then, develop transportation projects to deal with the impacts of the station.
- Lisa McGlynn asked about the project timeline for the commuter rail project.

- Mr. Sheffield responded commuter rail is not a project yet.
- Vice Chairman Dipola asked how many members are on the CAC and what constitutes a quorum.
 - Mrs. Lott responded the CAC has 25 members and 13 members establish a quorum.
- Vice Chairman Dipola thanked the members for attending the meetings and reminded them to reply when asked if attending to establish a quorum.
- Roy Buncome asked if it is possible to do a study regarding carpooling.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded the TPO has had a commuter services program for at least 30 years with a software program that ride matches people. We have stripped the program down because for the last 25 years the region has not been interested. There is no need for a study.
- Roy Buncome asked based on people's financial situation and people moving here that are accustomed to being in different transit environments if it would be effective to reintroduce the commuter services program to the public.
- Roy Buncome commented he has heard many people express an interest in a commuter services program.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded we do not have enough buy-in from the corporate market.
- Vice Chairman Dipola asked if this could be brought forth in relation to the LRTP.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded yes.

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Introduction

Federal laws and regulations require metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) to be designated for each urban area with a population greater than 50,000 people [23 CFR 450.310(a), 23 USC 134(d)]. This designation is accomplished by agreement between the Governor and the affected units of local government. The federal rules allow the states and units of local government to largely determine the specific composition of the MPOs. In Florida, Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, provides the requirements for MPO membership composition and apportionment of the voting membership.


In July 1979 the Florida Legislature enacted §334.214, Florida Statutes requiring *metropolitan planning* organizations be established in designated urbanized areas by January 1980. In compliance with this directive the *Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Jacksonville Urbanized Area* was subsequently created. In March 2000 the MPO officially changed its name to the *First Coast Metropolitan Planning Organization (First Coast MPO)*, and in September 2008 was rebranded as the *North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (North Florida TPO)*.

Metropolitan Planning Area Boundary

The boundaries of the MPA are determined by agreement between the MPO and the Governor and, at minimum, encompass the entire existing urban area (as defined by the Census Bureau) plus the contiguous area expected to become urban within a 20-year forecast period (23 CFR 450.312).

The North Florida TPO is located in Northeast Florida encompassing Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns counties. The TPO boundary remains unchanged from the 2010 update spanning approximately 3,000 square miles and containing three Urban Areas with over 50,000 population. These areas include the Jacksonville, St. Augustine and Fernandina Beach/Yulee Urban Areas. The TPO boundary contains 14 municipalities and according to the United States Bureau of the Census, has a 2020 population of 1,577,589. A map of the TPO's planning area boundary is provided in Figure 1.

Current & Proposed MPO Membership

Currently, the North Florida TPO board is comprised of 18 members (15 voting), as shown in Table 2. These members represent the counties of Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns, the incorporated cities of Atlantic Beach, Neptune Beach, Jacksonville Beach, St. Augustine, St. Augustine Beach, Fernandina Beach, Green Cove Springs, Keystone Heights and the towns of Baldwin, Callahan, Hillard, Orange Park and Penney Farms. The voting membership also includes five authority members and three non-voting members from the Florida Department of Transportation, the United States Navy and Baker County. The composition was agreed to by the MPO members in a membership apportionment plan approved by the TPO board in 2010 and affirmed by the Governor in 2012. There are no proposed changes to the North Florida TPO membership or voting structure from the 2010 adopted apportionment plan.

WHEREAS, Section 339.175(4)(a), Florida Statutes, requires the Governor to review the composition of the Metropolitan Planning Organizations membership in conjunction with the decennial census; and

WHEREAS, there are no changes to the North Florida TPO's boundary or board composition; No changes are required to the Interlocal Agreement adopted on April 12, 2012; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Florida TPO approves the submittal of a MPO Membership Apportionment Plan to the Governor's Office and retains the Interlocal Agreement adopted April 12, 2012.

Appendix B

Methodology for Apportionment of Membership Chapter 339.175 (4), Florida Statutes outlines how the Governor will apportion membership of individual MPOs. The Chapter specifies that "the Governor shall, with the agreement of the affected units of general purpose local government as required by federal rules and regulations, apportion the membership of the applicable TPO/MPO among the various governmental entities within the area. TPO/MPO members shall serve 4-year terms. A member who is a public official automatically terminates upon the member's leaving his or her elective or appointive office for any reason, or may be terminated by a majority vote of the total membership of the entity's governing board." These provisions are further elaborated upon in the North Florida TPOs Rules of Procedure and Bylaws.

The MPO voting membership, as reflected in the Membership Apportionment Plan, must consist of between 5 and 25 apportioned members; the exact number is to be determined on an equitable geographic-population ratio basis by the Governor, based on an agreement among the affected units of general purpose local government, as required by Federal rules and regulations. [s.339.175(3)(a), F.S.] Section 134 of Title 23, U.S. Code of Federal Regulation (CFR) further specifies that in areas designated as "transportation management areas" all public agencies that administer or operate a major mode of transportation within the metropolitan area be represented.

Currently, five independent transportation authorities are within the expanded boundary of the North Florida TPO and include the following:

- The Jacksonville Aviation Authority
- The Jacksonville Port Authority
- The Jacksonville Transportation Authority
- The Nassau County Ocean, Highway and Port Authority
- The St. Augustine-St. Johns County Airport Authority

Additionally, the voting membership of any MPO, whose geographical boundaries include any "county" as defined in s.125.011(1), F.S., [a county chartered under Subsection 6(e) Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida (Duval County)], must include an additional voting member appointed by that city's governing body for each city with a population of 50,000 or more residents. [s.339.176, F.S.]. The only City that meets this criteria in the North Florida TPO boundary is Jacksonville. This additional membership is applied after the equitable geographic population ratio.

Tables 1 and 2 show the population of each County as a percentage of total TPO population for a Policy Board with 13 elected officials (19 less the representatives of the five authorities plus one additional City of Jacksonville member).

As demonstrated by Tables 1 and 2, the difference in 2010 and 2020 population does not affect apportionment of membership on the TPO Policy Board.

To reduce the number of individuals at the table, the representatives of the City of Jacksonville consisting of the Mayor and three member of the Jacksonville City Council will have double-weighted votes. The additional City of Jacksonville vote is given to a representative of the three beaches communities consisting of Atlantic Beach, Jacksonville Beach or Neptune Beach rotating at their convenience

In addition to these members, the FDOT District 2 Secretary or designee and highest ranking member of the United States Navy (or designee) are ex officio members. The North Florida TPO also offers non-voting membership to one member of the Baker and Putnam County Commissions.

As specified in both Florida Statute and in the Rules and Procedures and Bylaws of the North Florida TPO all members have Alternate Members. If the voting membership is increased to 16 members further revisions will be needed to address the possibility of tied votes and how they will be handled.

STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR CREATION OF THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into this day of April, 2012, by and between the FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION; the COUNTY(IES) of Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns; the CITY(IES) of Jacksonville and St. Augustine; Jacksonville Aviation Authority, Jacksonville Port Authority, Jacksonville Transportation Authority, Nassau County Ocean Highway and Port Authority, and St. Augustine—St. Johns County Airport Authority, collectively "the parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the federal government, under the authority of 23 United States Code 134 and 49 United States Code 5303, requires each metropolitan area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, to have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the metropolitan area, and further requires the State Transportation Agency and the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities of each party for cooperatively carrying out such transportation planning;

WHEREAS, the parties to this Agreement desire to participate cooperatively in the performance, on a continuing basis, of a coordinated, comprehensive transportation planning process to assure that highway facilities, mass transit, rail systems, air transportation and other facilities will be properly located and developed in relation to the overall plan of community development;

WHEREAS, 23 United States Code 134, as amended by the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991, the Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty-first Century (Public Law 105-178, 112 Stat. 107), 49 United States Code 5303-5307, 23 Code of Federal Regulations 450.306, superseded in October 2005 by the adoption of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) which updated the same sections of the United States Code (USC) and Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), and Section 339,175, Florida Statutes, provide for the creation of Metropolitan Planning Organizations to develop transportation plans and programs for metropolitan areas;

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 USC 134(b), 49 USC 5303, 23 CFR 450.310(b), and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, a determination has been made by the Governor and units of general purpose local government representing at least 75% of the affected population (including the largest incorporated city, based on population as named by the Bureau of the Census) in the metropolitan area to designate a Metropolitan Planning Organization;

WHEREAS, since the inception of the state laws calling for creation of Metropolitan Planning Organizations in urbanized areas there has been created a Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Jacksonville Urbanized Area, which boundaries have expanded over time;

WHEREAS, pursuant to this Agreement, the parties wish to collectively participate in the metropolitan planning process as the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization. Further, the parties approved by unanimous vote an apportionment and boundary plan for presentation to the Governor on October 14, 2010;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, the Governor, by letter dated September 6, 2011, approved the apportionment and boundary plan submitted by the North Florida Transportation Planning

Organization;

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 CFR 450.314, and Section 339.175(10), Florida Statutes, an agreement must be entered into by the members of the MPO, Department, governmental entities and public transportation operators;

WHEREAS, this Agreement is intended to reflect the renaming of the First Coast Metropolitan Planning Organization as the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (NFTPO) and delineate the provisions for operation of the NFTPO;

WHEREAS, the undersigned parties have determined that this Agreement is consistent with Section 339.175(10), Florida Statutes;

WHEREAS, the undersigned parties have determined that this Agreement is consistent with the requirements of Section 163.01, Florida Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises, and representation herein, the parties desiring to be legally bound, do agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 RECITALS; DEFINITIONS

Section 1.01. <u>Recitals</u>. Each and all of the foregoing recitals are incorporated herein and acknowledged to be true and correct to the best of the parties' knowledge. Failure of any of the foregoing recitals to be true and correct shall not operate to invalidate this Agreement.

Section 1.02. <u>Definitions</u>. The following words when used in this Agreement (unless the context shall clearly indicate the contrary) shall have the following meanings:

Agreement means and refers to this instrument, as amended from time to time.

Department shall mean and refer to the Florida Department of Transportation, an agency of the State of Florida created pursuant to Section 20.23, Florida Statutes.

FHWA means and refers to the Federal Highway Administration.

FTA means and refers to the Federal Transit Administration.

Long-Range Transportation Plan is the 20-year plan which: identifies transportation facilities; identifies a financial plan that demonstrates how the plan can be implemented and assesses capital improvements necessary to preserve the existing metropolitan transportation system and make efficient use of existing transportation facilities, indicates proposed transportation enhancement activities; and in ozone/carbon monoxide nonattainment areas, is coordinated with the State Implementation Plan, all as required by 23 USC Section 134(c) and (g), 23 CFR Section 450.322, Section 339.175(7), Florida Statutes.

Metropolitan Area means and refers to the planning area as delineated by the NFTPO for the urbanized area containing at least a population of 50,000 as described in 23 USC 134(b)(1), 49 USC Section 5303(c)(1), and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, which shall be subject to the NFTPO planning authority.

MPO means and refers to the NFTPO formed pursuant to this Agreement.

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is the staged multi-year program of transportation improvement projects developed by the NFTPO consistent with the Long-Range Transportation Plan and developed pursuant to Title 23 USC 134(j), 49 USC 5303, 49 USC 5304, 23 CFR 450.324 and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes.

Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is the annual program developed in cooperation with the Department and public transportation providers, that lists all planning tasks to be undertaken during a program year, together with a complete description thereof and an estimated budget, all as required by 23 CFR 450.308 and Section 339.175(9), Florida Statutes.

ARTICLE 2 PURPOSE

Section 2.01. <u>General Purpose</u>. The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the NFTPO and recognize the boundary expansion and apportionment approved by the Governor. This Agreement shall serve:

- (a) To assist in the development of transportation systems embracing various modes of transportation in a manner that will maximize the mobility of people and goods within and through this metropolitan area of this state and minimize, to the maximum extent feasible for transportation-related fuel consumption and air pollution;
- (b) To develop transportation plans and programs, in cooperation with the Department, which plans and programs provide for the development of transportation facilities that will function as multi-modal and an intermodal transportation system for the metropolitan area;
- (c) To implement and ensure a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in coordinated plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of this affected metropolitan area in cooperation with the Department;
- (d) To assure eligibility for the receipt of federal capital and operating assistance pursuant to 23 USC 34 and 49 USC 5303 5307, 5309, and 5339; and
- (e) To carry out the metropolitan transportation planning process, in cooperation with the Department, as required by 23 USC 134 and 49 USC 5301 *et. seq.*; 23 CFR 420 and 450, and 49 CFR Part 613, Subpart A: and consistent with Chapter 339.175, Florida Statutes, and other applicable state and local laws.

Section 2.02. <u>Major MPO Responsibilities</u>. The MPO is intended to be a forum for cooperative decision making by officials of the governmental entities which are party to this Agreement in the development of transportation-related plans and programs, including but not limited to:

- (a) The Long-Range Transportation Plan;
- (b) The Transportation Improvement Program;
- (c) The Unified Planning Work Program;
- (d) A congestion management system for the metropolitan area and coordinated development of all other transportation management systems required by state or federal law;

- (c) Assisting the Department in mapping transportation planning boundaries required by state or federal law;
- (f) Assisting the Department in performing its duties relating to access management, functional classification of roads, and data collection; and
- (g) Performing such other tasks required by state or federal law.

Section 2.03. Coordination with the Department and Consistency with Comprehensive Plans. Chapter 334, Florida Statutes, grants the broad authority for the Department's role in transportation. Section 334.044, Florida Statutes, shows the legislative intent that the Department shall be responsible for coordinating the planning of a safe, viable and balanced state transportation system serving all regions of the State. Section 339.155, Florida Statutes, requires the Department to develop a statewide transportation plan, which considers, to the maximum extent feasible, strategic regional policy plans, MPO plans, and approved local government comprehensive plans. Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, specifies the authority and responsibility of the MPO and the Department in the management of a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process for the metropolitan area.

In fulfillment of this purpose and in the exercise of the various powers granted by Chapters 334 and 339, Florida Statutes, the parties to this Agreement acknowledge that decisions made by the MPO will be coordinated with the Department. All parties to this Agreement acknowledge that the provisions of the Local Government Comprehensive Planning and Land Development Regulation Act, Sections 163.3161-3215, Florida Statutes, are applicable to this Agreement and further acknowledge that their actions taken pursuant to this agreement will be consistent with local government comprehensive plans.

ARTICLE 3 MPO ORGANIZATION AND CREATION

Section 3.01. <u>Establishment of MPO</u>. The MPO for the metropolitan area as described in the membership apportionment plan approved by the Governor is hereby created and established pursuant to the Agreement to carry out the purposes and functions set forth in Articles 2 and 5. The legal name of this Metropolitan Planning Organization shall be the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization.

Section 3.02. MPO to operate pursuant to law. In the event that any election, referendum, approval, permit, notice, other proceeding or authorization is required under applicable law to undertake any power, duty, or responsibility hereunder, or to observe, assume, or carry out any of the provisions of this Agreement, the MPO will, to the extent of its legal capacity, comply with all applicable laws and requirements.

Section 3.03. Governing board to act as policy-making body of MPO. The governing board established pursuant to Section 4.01 of this Agreement shall act as the policy-making body for the MPO, be responsible for coordinating cooperative decision-making of MPO actions, and take required approval action as the MPO.

Section 3.04. <u>Requests Made Pursuant to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.</u> Subject to the right to claim an exemption from the Florida Public Records Law, Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, the parties shall submit to each other such data, reports, records, contracts, and other documents relating to its performance as a metropolitan planning organization as is requested. Charges are to be in accordance with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

Section 3.05. <u>Rights of review</u>. All parties to this Agreement and the affected federal funding agency (i.e., FHWA, FTA, and FAA) shall have the rights of technical review and comment on MPO projects.

ARTICLE 4 COMPOSITION; MEMBERSHIP; TERMS OF OFFICE

Section 4.01. Composition and membership of governing board.

(a) The membership of the MPO shall consist of 15 voting representatives and 1 non-voting representative. The names of the member local governmental entities and the voting apportionment of the governing board as approved by the Governor shall be as follows:

Section 4.02. <u>Terms</u>. The term of office of members of the MPO shall be four years. The membership of a member who is a public official automatically terminates upon said official leaving the elective or appointive office for any reason, or may be terminated by a majority vote of the total membership of the governmental entity represented by the member. A vacancy shall be filled by the original appointing entity. A member may be appointed for one or more additional four year terms.

ARTICLE 5 AUTHORITIES, POWERS, DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 5.01. General authority. The MPO shall have all authorities, powers and duties, enjoy all rights, privileges, and immunities, exercise all responsibilities and perform all obligations necessary or appropriate to managing a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process as specified in Section 339.175(5) and (6), Florida Statutes.

Section 5.02. Specific authority and powers. The MPO shall have the following powers and authority:

- (a) As provided in Section 339.175(6)(g), Florida Statutes, the MPO may employ personnel and/or may enter into contracts with local or state agencies and private planning or engineering firms;
- (b) As provided in Section 163.01(14), Florida Statutes, the MPO may enter into contracts for the performance of service functions of public agencies;
- (c) As provided in Section 163.01(5)(j), Florida Statutes, the MPO may acquire, own, operate, maintain, sell, or lease real and personal property;
- (d) As provided in Section 163.01(5)(m), Florida Statutes, the MPO may accept funds, grants, assistance, gifts or bequests from local, State, and Federal resources;
- (e) The MPO shall establish a budget which shall operate on a fiscal year basis consistent with any requirements of the Unified Planning Work Program, the MPO may assess member local governmental entities a fee to provide funds to operate the MPO, and may promulgate rules to govern the assessment and amount of said fees, but in no case may said assessment exceed one dollar (\$1.00) per capita of the population served by any entity;
- (f) The MPO may promulgate rules to effectuate its powers, responsibilities, and obligations enumerated herein; provided, that said rules do not supersede or conflict with applicable local and state laws, rules and regulations; and
- (g) The MPO shall have such powers and authority as specifically provided in Sections 163.01 and 339.175, Florida Statutes, and as may otherwise be provided by federal or state law.
- Section 5.03. <u>Duties and responsibilities</u>. In addition to those duties and responsibilities set forth in Article 2, the MPO shall have the following duties and responsibilities:
- (a) As provided in Section 339.175(6)(d), Florida Statutes, the MPO shall create and appoint a technical advisory committee;
- (b) As provided in Section 339.175(6)(e), Florida Statutes, the MPO shall create and appoint a citizens' advisory committee;
 - (c) As provided in Section 163.01(5)(o), Florida Statutes, the MPO membership shall be jointly and severally liable for liabilities, and the MPO may respond to such liabilities through the purchase of insurance or bonds, the retention of legal counsel, and, as appropriate, the approval of settlements of claims by its governing board. The indemnification provided herein shall be subject to and within the limitations set forth in Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, and to any other limitations, restrictions and prohibitions that may be provided by law, and shall not be deemed to operate as a waiver of the indemnifying party's sovereign immunity;
- (d) As provided in Section 339.175(9), Florida Statutes, the MPO shall establish an estimated budget which shall operate on a fiscal year basis consistent with any requirements of the UPWP;
 - (e) The MPO, in cooperation with the Department, shall carry out the metropolitan transportation planning

process as required by 23 CFR Parts 420 and 450, and 49 CFR Part 613, Subpart A, and consistent with Chapter 339, Florida Statutes, and other applicable state and local laws;

- (f) As provided in Section 339.175(10), Florida Statutes, the MPO shall enter into agreements with the Department, operators of public transportation systems and the metropolitan and regional intergovernmental coordination and review agencies serving the metropolitan area. These agreements will prescribe the cooperative manner in which the transportation planning process will be coordinated and included in the comprehensively planned development of the area;
 - (g) Perform such other tasks presently or hereafter required by state or federal law;
 - (h) Execute certifications and agreements necessary to comply with state or federal law; and
 - (i) Adopt operating rules and procedures.

ARTICLE 6 FUNDING; INVENTORY REPORT; RECORD-KEEPING

Section 6.01. <u>Funding</u>. The Department shall allocate to the MPO for its performance of its transportation planning and programming duties, an appropriate amount of federal transportation planning funds.

Section 6.02. <u>Inventory report</u>. The MPO agrees to inventory, to maintain records of and to insure proper use, control, and disposal of all nonexpendable tangible property acquired pursuant to funding under this Agreement. This shall be done in accordance with the requirements of 23 CFR Part 420, Subpart A, 49 CFR Part 18, Subpart C, and all other applicable federal regulations.

Section 6.03. Record-keeping and document retention. The Department and the MPO shall prepare and retain all records in accordance with the federal and state requirements, including but not limited to 23 CFR Part 420, Subpart A, 49 CFR Part 18, Subpart C, 49 CFR 18.42, and Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

ARTICLE 7 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Section 7.01. Constitutional or statutory duties and responsibilities of parties. This Agreement shall not be construed to authorize the delegation of the constitutional or statutory duties of any of the parties. In addition, this Agreement does not relieve any of the parties of an obligation or responsibility imposed upon them by law, except to the extent of actual and timely performance thereof by one or more of the parties to this Agreement or any legal or administrative entity created or authorized by this Agreement, in which case this performance may be offered in satisfaction of the obligation or responsibility.

Section 7.02. <u>Amendment of Agreement</u>. Amendments or modifications of this Agreement may only be made by written agreement signed by all parties hereto with the same formalities as the original Agreement. No amendment may alter the apportionment or jurisdictional boundaries of the MPO without approval by the Governor.

Section 7.03. Duration; withdrawal procedure.

(a) <u>Duration</u>. This Agreement shall remain in effect until terminated by the parties to this Agreement, but shall be reviewed by the parties every five years and updated as necessary.

- (b) Withdrawal procedure. Any party, except the Florida Department of Transportation, Jacksonville Transportation Authority, St. Johns County Commission (as the Transit Agency for the St. Augustine UA), Jacksonville Aviation Authority, St. Augustine-St. Johns County Airport Authority and the United States Bureau of the Census designated center cities (Jacksonville and St. Augustine), may withdraw from this Agreement after presenting in written form a notice of intent to withdraw to the other parties to this Agreement and the MPO, at least 90 days prior to the intended date of withdrawal. Upon receipt of the intended notice of withdrawal:
- (1) The withdrawing member and the MPO shall execute a memorandum reflecting the withdrawal of the member and alteration of the list of member governments that are signatories to this Agreement. The memorandum shall be filed in the Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court of each county in which a party hereto is located; and
- (2) The Office of the Governor shall be contacted, and the Governor, with the agreement of the remaining members of the MPO, shall determine whether any reapportionment of the membership is appropriate. The Governor and the MPO shall review the previous MPO designation, applicable Florida and local law, and MPO rules for appropriate revision. In the event that another entity is to afforded membership in the place of the member withdrawing from the MPO, the parties acknowledge that pursuant to 23 CFR 450.310, adding membership to the MPO does not automatically require redesignation of the MPO. In the event that a party who is not a signatory to this Agreement is afforded membership in the MPO, membership shall not become effective until this Agreement is amended to reflect that the new member has joined the MPO.

Section 7.04. <u>Notices</u>. All notices, demands and correspondence required or provided for under this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered in person or dispatched by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested. Notice required to be given shall be addressed as follows:

A party may unilaterally change its address or addressee by giving notice in writing to the other parties as provided in this section. Thereafter, notices, demands and other pertinent correspondence shall be addressed and transmitted to the new address.

Section 7.05. Interpretation.

- (a) <u>Drafters of Agreement</u>. The Department and the members of the MPO were each represented by or afforded the opportunity for representation by legal counsel and participated in the drafting of this Agreement and in choice of wording. Consequently, no provision should be more strongly construed against any party as drafter of this Agreement.
- (b) <u>Severability</u>. Invalidation of any one of the provisions of this Agreement or any part, clause or word, or the application thereof in specific circumstances, by judgment, court order, or administrative hearing or order shall not affect any other provisions or applications in other circumstances, all of which shall remain in full force and effect; provided, that such remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.
- (c) <u>Rules of construction</u>. In interpreting this Agreement, the following rules of construction shall apply unless the context indicates otherwise:
 - (1) The singular of any word or term includes the plural;
 - (2) The masculine gender includes the feminine gender; and
 - (3) The word "shall" is mandatory, and "may" is permissive.

Section 7.06. <u>Enforcement by parties hereto</u>. In the event of any judicial or administrative action to enforce or interpret this Agreement by any party hereto, each party shall bear its own attorney's fees in connection with such proceeding.

Section 7.07. Agreement execution: Use of counterpart signature pages. This Agreement, and any amendments hereto, may be simultaneously executed in several counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

Section 7.08. Effective date; Cost of recordation.

- (a) Effective date. This Agreement shall become effective upon its filing in the Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court of each county in which a party hereto is located. Any amendment hereto shall become effective only upon its filing in the Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court for each county in which a party hereto is located.
- (b) <u>Recordation</u>. The North Florida Transportation Planning Organization hereby agrees to pay for any costs of recordation or filing of this Agreement in the Office of the Circuit Court for each county in which a party is hereto located. The recorded or filed original hereof, or any amendment, shall be returned to the MPO for filing in its records.
