CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Norton called the meeting to order at 2 p.m. and Austin Chapman led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENT

None.

► A. <u>APPROVE THE JUNE 2, 2021 MEETING MINUTES</u>

Chairman Norton asked for approval of the minutes of the June Citizens Advisory Committee meeting.

Branch Davis moved to approve the June 2, 2021 minutes; Barney Roberts seconded; motion unanimously carried.

► B. FDOT REQUESTS AMENDING THE TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) FOR FY 2021/22 THROUGH FY 2025/26 TO INCLUDE PROJECTS IN THE ROLL FORWARD REPORT

Autumn Martinage presented the amendment to the Transportation Improvement Program for FY 2020/21 through FY 2025/26.

The Roll Forward Amendment includes projects or phases of projects that were approved in the FY 2021/22 through FY 2025/26 TIP, but were authorized or begun prior to July 1, 2021. These projects then "Roll Forward" into the first year of the new FY 2021/22 through FY 2025/26 TIP.

Ms. Martinage asked for questions.

• Thomas Martin wanted to know why one lane is closed on SR 301 near the test track project in Clay County.

Mr. Knight responded that he will look into it and report back to the group.

• Tyrona Clark-Murray wanted to know if the project limits for the SR 115 Soutel Drive to Nassau County Line project are correct.

Ms. Martinage responded that she will look into it and report back to the group.

Branch Davis moved to approve the FDOT's request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for FY 2021/22 through FY 2025/26 to include projects in the "Roll Forward" report; Barney Roberts seconded; motion unanimously carried.

C. <u>AMENDMENT OF THE UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP) FOR</u> <u>FY 2020/21 THROUGH FY 2021/22 (ENCUMBERING FY 2019/20 PL FUNDS)</u>

Denise Bunnewith presented the amendment of the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) for FY 2020/21 through FY 2021/22 to encumber FY 2019/20 PL funds.

At the end of the prior year's UPWP (FY 2018/19 through FY 2019/20), there was a contract balance in the amount of \$198,005 (PL funds). FDOT now advises that these funds may be encumbered into this year's UPWP (FY 2021/22). These funds will be programmed to Task 1.5 General Consultant Services to be used to support additional work task orders or contingencies for current studies.

Ms. Bunnewith asked for questions.

• Michael Wallwork wanted to know why after five years FDOT is redoing the landscaping on US 17 and Kingsley Avenue.

Ms. Martinage responded that she will look into it and report back to the group.

Branch Davis moved to approve the amendment of the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) for FY 2020/21 through FY 2021/22 to encumber FY 2019/20 PL funds; Austin Chapman seconded; motion unanimously carried.

D. <u>AMENDMENT OF THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION</u> <u>AGREEMENT (INCREASING BUDGETARY CEILING BY \$371,747 –</u> <u>REMAINING BALANCE FROM CLOSE OUT OF FY 2018/19 THROUGH FY</u> <u>2019/20</u>

Denise Bunnewith presented the amendment of the Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement to increase the budgetary ceiling.

At the end of the prior year's Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) (FY 2018/19 through FY 2019/20), a total contract balance was \$371,747. An amendment was approved in March 2021 to encumber the remaining SU and CMAQ funds from FY 2019/20 in the amounts for \$142,625 and \$31,117 respectively.

This amendment is to encumber the remaining \$198,005 of PL funds from FY 2019/20. The previous UPWP amendment and this proposed amendment will increase the ceiling of the Metropolitan Planning Agreement, thus creating the need for a contract amendment.

Ms. Bunnewith asked for questions. There are no questions at this time.

Branch Davis moved to approve the amendment of the Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement to increase the budgetary ceiling by \$371,747; Mario Dipola seconded; motion unanimously carried.

E. <u>DRAFT PROJECT RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SU FUNDING FOR FY 2022/23</u> THROUGH FY 2026/27

Jim Knight of FDOT presented the draft project recommendations for SU funding for FY 2022/23 through FY 2026/27.

Staff will present this item in September for final review and action.

Mr. Knight asked for questions.

• Tyrona Clark-Murray asked for more information regarding the Main Street and US 17 from New Berlin Road to Max Legget Parkway project.

Mr. Knight responded that this project will widen the roadway from two to four lanes. It is a \$44 million project that includes \$23 million from the City of Jacksonville, FDOT dollars and SU funding.

• John Stack commented that according to the SU and CMAQ spreadsheets Nassau County is not getting their equitable distribution.

Ms. Bunnewith responded that a large portion to widen SR 200 was funded with TPO funding. Distributing funding balances out over time.

Pat Keogh commented that he would like to see the funding distribution balance out.

Mr. Knight responded that overall Nassau County has received more than their fair share on the five to ten year time-frame. Nassau County is 4.8 percent of the program and five percent of the population in the urban boundary. The county is exactly where it should be.

• Chairman Norton commented that it would be nice to have those same statistics for the other counties.

Mr. Knight responded that it is 65,15,15 and 5.

- Chairman Norton wanted to know if there are statistics or numbers to represent the dollars spent.
- Pat Keogh would like to see the funding distribution demonstrated in numbers.

Mr. Knight responded that there is not an official percentage that anyone gets.

• Mario Dipola wanted to know why the St. Augustine Parking project and the SR A1A Marsh Landing project do not have FPID numbers.

Mr. Knight responded that these projects are not programmed yet.

• Michael Wallwork commented that there are a lot of road widening projects being done. These road widening projects pose a safety concern and ultimately lead to an increase in crashes. Mr. Wallwork feels that this goes against the goal of zero fatalities that the TPO adopted last year.

Mr. Knight commented that most projects on the SU and CMAQ list involve intersection and bike and pedestrian improvements.

• Thomas Martin commented that there is objection to the Blanding Blvd. project that includes the intersections at Wells Road and Argyle Forest Blvd. This project is extremely expensive, and will not alleviate the traffic conditions on either side of the intersection.

Mr. Knight responded that the plan is to make improvements in the I-295 area. Due to the cost, this was not included in the current project. FDOT ran the Measures of Effectiveness of this being a stand-alone project and they were drastic. Many problems are from the queuing coming back from Wells Road.

• Chairman Norton wanted to know if FDOT has a proposed change that will create an impact. What is the solution to alleviate the traffic? He also wanted to know if that is a separate study that the county has to request or is that something FDOT will do.

Mr. Knight responded that FDOT sometimes conducts a study because we see a need or receive a citizen or local government request.

F. DRAFT PROJECT RECOMMENDATIONS FOR CMAQ FUNDING FOR FY 2022/23 THROUGH FY 2026/27

Jim Knight of FDOT presented the draft project recommendations for CMAQ funding for FY 2022/23 through FY 2026/27.

Staff will present this item in September for final review and action.

Mr. Knight asked for questions.

• Tyrona Clark-Murray commented that she hopes the improvements at this intersection do not detract from the neighborhood's character.

Mr. Knight responded that he will send her a concept drawing of the proposed improvements for her review and comment.

G. MANAGED LANES PRESENTATION

Jim Knight of FDOT gave a brief update on managed lanes.

Mr. Knight asked for questions.

• Austin Chapman asked Mr. Knight to explain the additional costs of constructing managed lanes.

Mr. Knight responded that the costs are associated with the operation and construction of managed lanes. The initial cost could be more than 50 percent higher than the cost to construct a general use lane.

• Austin Chapman commented that when managed lanes first came about the idea was not to take free lanes and toll them. Mr. Chapman wanted to know if there is a middle ground where you could post a sign saying future managed lanes, which would give flexibility to make them managed lanes.

Mr. Knight responded that legally there is nothing stopping that, but it is not a practical solution. It would be better to toll the road at a very low rate for a specific period of time. You don't want to harm the lanes that are there. For express lanes you can build flyovers, which are really expensive or have them weave across. Weaving across will degrade the lanes you have.

• Mario Dipola commented that the funding mechanism has not kept pace. If it is managed lanes, the funds are managed by the Turnpike. That is a separate pot of money. Funds received from tolls are independently managed.

Mr. Knight responded that on a road like the First Coast Expressway the tolls help pay for the road.

 Chairman Norton, on behalf of Jim Green, wanted to know what percentage of the operations and maintenance costs of the current managed lanes are covered by tolls.

Mr. Knight responded that it is slightly upside down.

• Chairman Norton, on behalf of Jim Green, wanted to know what do the operations and maintenance costs include beyond the costs of toll collection.

Mr. Knight responded that they include ITS to operate the facility and delineator maintenance.

• Bernie O'Connor asked if there are noticeable benefits of the managed lanes in the Mandarin area.

Mr. Knight responded that when you look at the project as a whole we are seeing tremendous benefit.

- Mr. Knight commented that without tolls we would not be where we are in constructing the First Coast Expressway.
- Chairman Norton commented that he previously lived in an area where high demand toll lanes were the norm. These lanes are set up by time and demand and managed lanes are similar in structure.

Mr. Knight responded that we charge \$.50 in the peak and it is free in the offpeak and doesn't vary based on traffic.

• Bernie O'Connor commented that the I-95 from Butler Blvd. project heading towards downtown was set up to be managed lanes. Mr. O'Connor wanted to know if these lanes will be express lanes.

Mr. Knight responded that we converted that from three general use lanes in each direction plus two express in each direction to five general use lanes. The savings allowed us to extend this project down to Baymeadows Road.

H. SMART NORTH FLORIDA UPDATE

Clayton Levins gave the following update.

- Several start-ups have partnered with the surrounding counties to deploy their technology pilot project.
 - Robotics is using data analytics and artificial intelligence to assess pavement management conditions in St. Augustine.
 - Ubicquia is working on a smart lighting project in Keystone Heights. They are also using vertical assets to give access to public Wi-Fi within the Jacksonville area.
- IDE upgrades are ongoing.

• Mario Dipola wanted to know what can the CAC members do to help promote SNF.

Mr. Levins responded that advocacy is always important. Having the CAC participate in our gatherings and explore all avenues for involvement. If CAC members can advocate to their local county officials on our behalf, it would be a huge help.

• Chairman Norton wanted to know if Mr. Levins sees the TPO as a sponsor of an incubator.

Mr. Levins responded that incubators have different levels. He sees the TPO as opening the door and giving start-up companies the ability to test their technologies in real-time scenarios.

I. OLD BUSINESS

1. June 2, 2021 CAC Meeting – Response Needed from Staff/FDOT

• Several months ago, Mr. Solomon sent a letter to FDOT asking for an elevated bridge on New Kings Road over the Ribault River. The Ribault River needs to be dredged, as it has a considerable amount of muck. Mr. Solomon asked that Mr. Sheffield request this information from FDOT on his behalf.

Jim Knight responded that there are no plans to raise the bridge. Mr. Knight said FDOT can have their maintenance personnel take a look at that area. Mr. Knight requested that Ms. Tyrona Clark-Murray provide the exact location on a map.

2. August 4, 2021 CAC Meeting – Response Needed from Staff/FDOT

• Thomas Martin wanted to know why one lane is closed on SR 301 near the test track project in Clay County.

Mr. Knight responded that he will look into it and report back to the group.

• Tyrona Clark-Murray wanted to know if the project limits for the SR 115 Soutel Drive to Nassau County Line project are correct.

Ms. Martinage responded that the SR 115 from Soutel Drive on the south to the Nassau C/L on the north project limits are correct.

• Michael Wallwork wanted to know why FDOT is redoing the landscaping after only five years on US 17 and Kingsley Avenue.

Ms. Martinage responded with the following:

<u>432444-1 – Kingsley Avenue (SR 224) from Bellair Blvd. to US 17</u> This project is in the Roll Forward Amendment Report with approximately \$177,000 in state funds programmed for FY 2022. The project began in April 2016 and is projected to wrap up this fiscal year. No additional funds are programmed in future years.

<u>432445-1 – Park Avenue (US 17) from Duval C/L to Milwaukee Avenue</u> This project is in the Roll Forward Amendment Report with approximately \$214,000 in state funds programmed for FY 2022. The project began in April 2016 and is projected to wrap up this fiscal year. No additional funds are programmed in future years.

J. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

- New member training is tentatively planned for October.
- John Stack commented that the Property Owner's Bill of Rights is required for each government to include in their comprehensive plan. Mr. Stack thinks the TPO should help make people aware of their rights as we build roads and bridges within our region.
- Michael Wallwork commented that earlier this year the Town of Orange Park submitted three projects for possible funding. We were never notified of the status of our submission. Mr. Wallwork suggested that staff notify the applicants when their projects are not chosen.

Ms. Bunnewith responded that we have a limited amount of financial resources for studies. Typically, we choose nine or ten projects a year.

• Mario Dipola wanted to know if there was a way to conduct a hybrid meeting if we are not under an emergency situation like COVID.

Ms. Larson responded that the TPO has to follow the guidance from the MPOAC and the Governor.

• Austin Chapman wanted to know if there was a way for members to participate virtually for discussion purposes only.

K. PUBLIC COMMENT

• Walter Kloss wanted to know who funds SNF.

Mr. Levins responded that the seed money comes from the TPO. We are a 501(c)3 and hope to have different funding partners as we continue to grow.

• Walter Kloss wanted to know what SNF is doing for bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Mr. Levins responded that Mr. Sheffield would be able to better answer that question.

• Walter Kloss wanted to know if CR 220 shown in the table is the whole segment from Knight Boxx to west of Henley Road.

Mr. Knight responded that the CR 220 show in the table is the FDOT funded portion from Knight Boxx to west of Henley Road.

• Walter Kloss wanted to know if it includes the intersection improvements.

Mr. Knight responded that the intersection improvements is not a FDOT project.

• Jennifer Ross wanted to know about US 17 and the traffic lights. Traveling US 17 from the base is seemingly always busy.

L. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:13 p.m. The next CAC meeting will be September 1, 2021.

The North Florida TPO was notified that the final allocation of Federal Transit Administration 5305(d) funds for Fiscal Year 2021/22 is \$38,811 less than the amount that was programmed in the May 2020 adoption of the Unified Planning Work Program. The final allocation was unknown at the time of budgeting. Now that the final allocation has been received, the UPWP must be amended to reflect that amount. Resolution 2021-6 is being submitted for approval, authorizing a Joint Participation Agreement in the amount of \$657,808.

This amendment is to also replace the 10% Local and 10% State hard match with a 20% soft match using toll credits at the direction of the Florida Department of Transportation.
